 - The space window on the south side contains a moon rock
 - o It took exactly 83 years to build (Sep 29, 1907 -- Sep 29, 1990)
 - President Woodrow Wilson, Helen Keller, her teacher, and Anne Frank were interred at this Cathedral.
- **★** 2:30→ National African American Museum.
 - Artifacts: Certificate of Freedom for Joseph Trammel, Louis Armstrong Selmer
 Trumpet, Muhammed Ali headgear, "Point of Plains Slave Cabin"
 - We learned a lot about contributions from the African American community








- ★ On our last day, May 19, we visited the U.S. Air Force Memorial, and Arlington National Cemetery before making our trip back home.
