GOOGLE HANGOUTS MEET

To access Google Meet from a laptop or desktop computer, simply click on the link your teacher sent you. The Meet session will open in your browser. It works best in the Chrome browser.

To access Google Meet from an iPhone or iPad, you must first download the free Hangouts Meet app. On Bedford High School student iPads, this app is available in Self-Service. Then you can click on the link your teacher sent you, and the Meet session will open in the app.

ZOOM

To access Zoom from a laptop or desktop computer, click on the link your teacher sent you. The first time you enter a Zoom meeting, you will be asked to download the Zoom client. You can also download it ahead of time from [here](#).

To access Zoom from an iPhone or an iPad, you must first download the free Zoom app. On Bedford High School student iPads, this app is available in Self-Service. Then you can click on the link your teacher sent you, and the Zoom session will open in the app.

NOTE: When you first enter a video conference, please put your microphone on mute by clicking on the microphone button at the bottom of the screen.

VIDEO CONFERENCING AND STUDENT PRIVACY

Faculty will use either Google Meets or Zoom for video conferencing with their classes, small groups or individual students. Both Google Meets and Zoom (for institutions that have subscriptions as we do) protect student information and observe FERPA regulations. For additional information please click on the links below:

IMPORTANT: HOW STUDENTS ACCESS ZOOM

However, in order for students' privacy to be protected when using Zoom, the students MUST access it only through the link that the teacher sends. Should students access Zoom through their own accounts or through a third party program, e.g., social media site, their information WILL NOT be protected.

RECORDING SESSIONS

Teachers may record sessions to be able to make them available to students who are "absent" during the live session. This is an allowable but not an expected practice. IF you do not want your child's participation recorded, then the camera and/or microphone should be "cancelled", which can be done easily on the Zoom or Google Meets screens.

At the same time students or parents MAY NOT record sessions.

BULLYING OR HARASSMENT

The district expects that engagement with video conferencing by all parties will involve appropriate behavior. School rules and legal requirements will be in force regarding any online bullying or harassment associated with video conferencing.

ENVIRONMENT

Ideally, students will be in a quiet space during video conferencing, both so that the student can concentrate on the "class" and so other family interactions are not captured visually or aurally. However, for both students and faculty, we know that such conditions will not always be possible. Two practices may help to minimize "invasions of privacy."

1) if students face their computer with their backs to a wall, the camera will only capture their image and no other family members moving about. 2) the teacher can mute all students until a student wants to speak and then the student can selectively unmute to talk. The student can also add comments via the Chat feature on both platforms.
