Dear Parent/Guardian:

The first month and a half of school has already passed us, and it has been a fantastic start! The kids are fantastic!!! We continue to reap the benefits of our "Accept the Challenge effort," as our school data that shows us that we continue to make progress in that ever-so intangible social aspect of the middle years. JGMS students are currently taking our annual anti-bullying survey. Data from last year's survey tells us that approximately 60 percent of our students have neither been bullied or cyberbullied recently and that 80 percent feel that bullying at school is either "very rare" or "happens sometimes but not often." I am certain that the work that we are doing in advisories and followed-up by general interactions between student and adult, our kids are positively responding to our simple message of "treat people the way you want to be treated." I appreciate the efforts you have made to support us in this endeavor. I hope you get a chance to check in regularly on my "Principal's Corner" blog, which you may access by going to the JGMS website and clicking on the "JGMS Principal's Corner" link, that focuses on positive youth development through our "Accept the Challenge" initiative.

JGMS students saw two anti-bullying presentations in September (please check out my blog for more information about these), and JGMS parents also got a chance to view a presentation on bullying by the Middlesex District Attorney's office prior to the start of Open House on Thursday, September 22nd. I am happy to say that the auditorium was packed with parents.

Last week in Advisory, students reviewed the annual Full Value Contract and, hopefully, signed it to indicate their commitment to its basic tenets:

1. I will respect everyone, even if a person is not in my "friend" group.

- 2. I won't be a bystander. I will support those in need.
- 3. I will reach out and include all people.
- 4. I understand that it is my responsibility to speak up if I know someone is being targeted.

I would like to invite you all to please sign up to receive both the JGMS daily announcements and eNewsletters. You will get the most up-to-date information that way. Also, while you are on the website, please spend some time clicking around, as there is much information available for parents and students.

Truancy Letter to Parents

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Every year, The Middlesex District Attorney's Office in collaboration with your local school district sends out this letter to all parents of students in Middlesex County. Though students and their families face many challenges throughout the school year, one of the most important concerns we share is the need for consistent and timely school attendance for all students.

The consequences for failing to attend school are serious and well-documented. Truancy has been identified as a potential predictor of criminal behavior, drug use, and is often associated with lowered academic achievement, self-esteem, and even employment potential. In addition, several studies have found that a pattern of poor attendance in early grades is linked to an increased likelihood for dropping out of school in later years.

Parents and guardians, as well as

students themselves, have the statutory responsibility to ensure that attendance at school is regular and timely. If a school identifies a student who is exhibiting an attendance problem, which includes tardiness, the school is required by law to address that problem. This could be as simple as notifying the parent or guardian and working together to improve that student's attendance. However, in extreme instances, it may require the school to solicit assistance from the Court or The Department of Children and Families.

Enclosed you will find a summary of the Massachusetts General Laws pertaining to attendance. We encourage you to review this as well as your school's policy on attendance. Please feel free to contact the principal of your child's school should you wish to discuss this information further.

We all share the goal of enabling our students to reach their full potential,

and that begins with a student's regular and timely attendance at school. Thank you for your anticipated cooperation. We look forward to a successful school year!

The School year is underway and business is picking up in the nurse's office. We have had lots of coughs and colds already. Students should remain home if they have a fever above 100.4 degrees, and should only return to school if fever free for 24 hours without tylenol or ibuprofen.

Reminder: A physical report is due for all sixth graders as well as students who are new to Bedford schools.

School wide Vision and Hearing screening will take place in Novem-

ber. Students who wear corrective lenses should remember to have them available.

The Ma Dept of Public Health mandates annual height and weight screening for grades 1 4 7 and 10. Each child's height and weight will be used to calculate the BMI. The results are kept confidential and will be mailed directly to parents. BMI is a "weight to height for age" index that can be a useful tool in early identification of possible health risk factors among children and youth. Please feel free to contact me with any questions about BMI screening or if

Annual Report Card

To the Bedford Community:

I am pleased to present you with the annual Report Card for the Bedford Public Schools for 2011. The federal legislation, No Child Left Behind (NCLB), requires all states, school districts, and schools to report student assessment results, dropout rates, and teacher qualifications to the community on an annual basis. Bedford's Report Card results are available to you on the district webpage: www.bedford.k12.ma.us.

In terms of the NCLB reporting requirements, Bedford has achieved the following:

- All of our subgroups at Bedford High School are making AYP.
- Virtually all of our teachers (99.2%) are considered "highly qualified" for the subject(s) they teach.

While we are pleased with Bedford's overall progress to date, we also recognize that we have work to do in terms of student achievement as we disaggregate the achievement of certain student cohorts. That said, we also recognize that in Massachusetts, the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education has adopted the highest student performance standards in the nation. In Massachusetts, *all students* are expected to reach the "proficient level" on MCAS by 2014. Since MCAS is recognized as one of the most difficult state assessments in the nation, reaching that standard for *all students* will challenge every school district in the Commonwealth. It is my

hope that you will find the Report Card helpful in providing you with a snapshot of the schools.

Moreover, the Bedford Public Schools is committed to providing quality instruction for all students and does so by employing the most qualified individuals to teach and support each student in the classroom. Under NCLB, teachers must hold a Massachusetts teaching license at the Preliminary, Initial, or Professional level and demonstrate subject matter competency in the areas they teach. NCLB standards apply to the subject matter taught by teachers. The report card contains general information about the teachers in our school as a whole. In addition, you may request individual information about the qualifications of your child's teacher(s) as well as any paraprofessionals who may be assisting the teacher. If you would like to receive any of the information listed above for your child's teacher, please contact my office.

If you have any questions about the data, please call me, or any of our principals. Should you require a hard copy of the results, please contact my office. Thanks for your continued support of the work we do to make the Bedford Public Schools the best that they can be.

From the desk of Student Owned Strategies (S.O.S.)

We have been very busy in S.O.S since the start of classes this year. The class started off with an overview of the class and a discussion on what S.O.S stands for. We then dove into the five keys of learning (Author's Craft, Background Knowledge, Purpose Setting, Active Learning and Metacognition) and discussed with students how each of the keys work together in an academic setting as well as in life outside of school.

dents can use in other classes to help them academically. These tools include ways to take more effective notes, such as two-column note taking and power notes. We will also use these tools in the writing process. We will discuss how these tools such as power notes and concept definition maps can be used to organize a brainstorm list and then transformed into paragraphs.

Within the next few days we are excited to roll out our S.O.S semes-

ter project. This project is the culmination of our work so far. Students will be required to incorporate all five of the learning keys by creating a mini booklet with two stories, a table of contents and so much more! In addition to the project, students will be assessed on their mastery of the five keys of learning just in time for the end of the semester.

Performing Arts

General music students in grade 6 are working on rhythmic notation using drums and hand-held percussion instruments. Each student is preparing a presentation on a music instrument as well. Occasionally we sing together using the songbook "Getting America Singing... Again". Soon we will be moving into a study of the development of music notation through world history, and an exploration of the aural/oral tradition in world cultures.

Students in 7th grade **theater arts class** started this year with full-class cumulative invented stories, and now we are reading skits and plays in the story-theater style. This is a relaxing and entertaining way of practicing skills in oral presentation, which include attention to volume, speed, diction, inflection, and body and facial expression. We have also started playing beginning improvisation and theater games.

All of our **performing ensembles** are off to a great start this year! A calendar with all the concert dates for Band, Chorus and Orchestra is posted on the JGMS website under "Academics - Music." Upcoming concerts include the Band and Orchestra concert on Tuesday, December 6th, and the Choral concert on Thursday, December 8th. Both concerts start at 7 pm.

The **JGMS Bands** have been busy making music on stage since September. We're proud to say the Grade 6 Band has 32 students who have continued on from the Lane School! They are currently learning a catchy piece called "New Orleans Strut" and a more difficult composition, "Overture to Tomorrow." Additionally, the Grade 7 & 8 Bands are doing well with an arrangement of the classic band piece "American Patrol." They also have a

challenge piece titled "March for Kim" requiring advanced musicianship skills including meter changes and extended note ranges on their instruments.

The **JGMS Orchestra** classes bounce around a bit from the Large Group Instruction Room to the Music Room and eventually to the Concert Hall. Our talented and hard-working orchestra members are rehearsing in preparation for our winter performance! Selections include: *Grade 6* - Calypso Capers (with some exciting syncopated motives), Golden Fields (a lush, beautifully-scored work by movie composer, Alan Lee Silva, and The Lonely Bull (an arrangement of the Herb Alpert and The Tijuana Brass tune). *Grades 7/8* - Serenade for Strings (an arrangement of the gorgeous Tchaikovsky piece), Rocky Mountain Switchback ((a lively, bluegrass-style selection by composer Robert Frost), and Romantic Etude (a nice arrangement of the popular Chopin Etude in E Major.)

Besides their classroom work, many students are actively involved in practicing and preparing for the Eastern Junior District festival in January. Many, not necessarily all who are auditioning for this festival, are busy studying privately with our POMS instructors as they gain more skills on their respective instruments. All levels will be performing some of the above selections in our concert on Tuesday, December 6!

Chorus classes are in full swing. Mrs. Budka, Mrs. Pritchett and Mr Felker are working on an exciting program with many different style of music in our repertoire. We go from sixteenth century madrigals, to folk music from Brazil and the Georgia Sea Islands, through to pop

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contemporary music. We still find time to work on our vocal pitch and quality, using sight-reading skills practice with solfege. In addition to our first concert of December 8th, stay tuned for more info about our appearance at Barnes and Noble in December for the annual Bedford Education Foundation fundraising event!

Junior District Music Festival: The Eastern District of the Massachusetts Music Educator's Association offers an opportunity for higher-level singers and instrumentalists to audition for the Eastern District Music Festival. Vocal and instrumental music students will be given information about the festival during band, orchestra and chorus classes. Curriculum Updates

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Social Studies

Both teams are in full swing with our Five Themes of Geography Flipbook. Students were assigned a country in South America, Central America, or Europe and have been researching that country in terms of the five themes of geography. Students have also been sharpening their mapping skills by working on an atlas packet that is due October 18 for both red and blue students.

English

The blue team has completed our Descriptive Writing unit with wonderfully bright, rich, echoing, flavorful, and tactile results. Thank you to all students for your efforts on this project! We are plunging into Narnia now with our Magician's Nephew unit and will soon be starting character studies.

The red team has completed our first vocabulary unit. The next set of words will be offered in another week or so. Students will select three strategies to use to study on their own. This is our first real experience with self-guided study, so it might be helpful to check in with your son or daughter with regard to their progress. We are also knee-deep in our descriptive writing unit and are working to bring our writing to life by using strong verbs, specific sensory details, and by showing rather than telling. Creativity abounds in room A221!

Science

In science, we're continuing with our introduction to basic science skills. After becoming familiar with the metric system and lab safety, we're putting these skills to use by conducting experiments. Over the next few weeks, students will be working towards designing their own experiments to test.

Math

In sixth grade math, we have recently completed unit 1 where we reviewed many of the basic concepts that were covered in fifth grade. We also introduced the use of exponents and looked at problems involving exponential growth. As we move forward into unit 2, we will be working on concepts involving decimals and introducing dividing decimals by whole numbers and other decimals.

Grade 7 News

We are having a great 1st Quarter in the 7th Grade! Interims were posted on Aspen, so if you have not checked them, please do. The quarter ends on November 4. Parent conferences will be held on Wednesday, November 16, and Wednesday, December 7. Information about signing up for conferences will be sent out from the main office.

Here is what has been happening in your child's classes:

Math:

7th Grade Math and Pre-Algebra students are covering a unit on Integers. The students will be working on a project, applying graphing of coordinates, in the next few weeks. 7th Grade Math students will move on to a unit

on fractions. Having a solid foundation with their basic multiplication facts will be extremely helpful for students as we move on to this next unit. In Pre-Algebra, the next chapter the students will focus on solving equations and inequalities.

7th grade is using the McDougal-Littell book series. Pre-Algebra students use Math Course 3 and 7th Grade Math students use Math Course 2, and the books should remain at home. There are supplemental materials supporting each chapter at: www.classzone.com and usernames and passwords were issued for access to the online textbook. Homework assignments and access to classroom lessons can be found on the class Moodle

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site using the student's JGMS username and password.

Social Studies:

Students have completed their study of archaeology and have been learning the answer to the unit's essential question, 'Who and what define history?' Students learned about prehistory, culture, different types of sources, and how to distinguish between a fact, inference, and opinion. Students have watched two videos to help them to understand how archaeologists, anthropologists, and historians evaluate and interpret the sources they find to put together the story of the past. The first was a National Geographic video about the ancient cities of Pompeii and Herculaneum as sites rich in archaeological evidence. The second was a PBS video called Other People's Garbage that followed modern archaeologists in California and Boston as they race to save artifacts from being destroyed or lost to construction projects. Students have begun the second unit of the year, which focuses on early people. Each student has been given a textbook, called A Message of Ancient Days, so that it can be used for homework assignments. Students should not bring the textbook to school, but should keep it in a safe place at home.

English:

In English students have been reading, writing and reflecting! They started this year by reading a short story about a nightmarish first day of school in hopes that no matter how our students' years began, they could not compare to the poor soul in the story. Also, students wrote a friendly email in which they shared interesting things about themselves and their goals for English this year. In addition, students have expanded their vocabularies, and reviewed the parts of speech with the **Word Generation** and **Vocabulary-Lit** programs. Students were also assigned a book project that is due toward the end of the quarter. After reading a few short stories, students are now looking forward to beginning our folklore unit beginning with famous fables and fables they will create themselves showing their writing skills and ability to teach a moral. We are looking forward to discovering the life lessons the students have learned and will share.

Science:

In science classes, students have completed a miniproject on the 6 characteristics of all living things. Presently the students are working on Ecology, learning about ecosystems and their components, as well as learning how living things obtain the energy they need for life. In the next couple weeks students will make their own miniature ecosystem using plastic 2-liter soda containers.

We look forward to meeting you at parent conferences. Enjoy the fall weather!

Spanish News

Grade 6 Spanish

Sixth grade Spanish students will soon study the verb qustar and many new infinitives. They will be asking and answering questions about what they like and what they like to do. They are beginning to create original sentences with ser and ser de and subject pronouns. Our first lesson takes place in the cultural context of Miami, Florida. Recently all Spanish 6 students received their new Spanish workbook called Más Práctica. In the last section of this workbook students can find a resource section with complete vocabulary lists and grammar points for each chapter. This is most helpful to students completing

Grade 7 Spanish

The students are completing the chapter in which they are learning to talk about schedules, ask and tell time, ask questions, say where they are going, and request food (Unit2/Etapa2). The cultural setting is Mexico City. They are going to be starting the next chapter (Unit2/Etapa3), in which they will discuss plans, sequence events, and talk about places and people they know, still based in Mexico City.

Grade 8 Spanish

Grade eight students have been learning to ask for and give directions with regular affirmative tú commands. They have learned new vocabulary associated with identifying places, giving directions and using different modes of transportation. They have been using the prepositions of place to describe the location of any stores and other places in the city. This is all taking place in the cultural context of Oaxaca, Mexico.

French News

Grade 6 French

In French 6 we have just finished reviewing the basic greetings and nationalites. We have gone to the computer lab and familiarized ourselves with Quizlet and other online study programs. The students have been completing activites both in pairs and groups. We have practiced numbers up to 60. We are also learning to use the informal and formal when addressing people.

Grade 7 French

In French 7 we have just finished leçon 8 and 9 which focuses on adjectives and various ways to form questions. The students have presented mini dialogues with partners as well as a description of their room. We are currently learning the song Les Champs- Elysées. The students are using various programs to help them with review and pronunciation such as Quizlet, Quia.com and Classzone.

Grade 8 French

In French 8 we are finishing up some irregular verbs forms and learning about patterns and using pneumonic devices to help us remember verb charts. The students have reviewed a unit on clothing and demonstrative adjectives. We have used the web to visit a large department store in France as well as for French review with programs such as Quizlet and Classzone.com. The students are now able to write short descriptions and are more confident telling stories to the class or in groups with images as their cues.

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Notes from the Gifted and Talented and Differentiation Instruction Program

Gifted and Talented E-mail List

All parents and students are invited to sign-up to receive e-mails from Lisa Fontaine-Rainen regarding opportunities particularly appropriate for gifted students, both in and out of school. Lisa will send out information on opportunities in the area, school events, and anything else that might be of interest. Gifted and Talented Programming through Differentiation

Students with particular gifts and talents have many opportunities to learn and excel at JGMS. Many of these opportunities are provided in the regular classroom, through differentiation. Teachers provide students with challenging options in the context of the regular curriculum, based on student needs and interests. The Gifted and Talented and Differentiated Instruction Teacher, Lisa Fontaine-Rainen, provides support to teachers on differentiation. Feel free to contact the classroom teachers if you feel your child needs additional challenge.

Advanced Mathematics

Mathematics can be particularly challenging to differentiate. We acknowledge that some students need a qualitatively different mathematics curriculum on a daily basis. These needs change throughout the year, based largely on readiness. One way we work to meet these needs is to pre-test students in mathematics for every unit, and provide alternate curriculum to some students who show the need for more advanced work. The advanced math pull-out classes work on units that parallel the regular curriculum, taking it deeper and to a more challenging level. For the first unit of 6th grade, the pullout class has worked with expressing numbers as powers of other numbers, become masters of estimation of all kinds, and learned the "why" behind divisibility rules. In the second unit, which has just begun, we are working on understanding decimals and base ten at a deep level by applying our understanding of place value to different bases. The first 7th grade unit focuses on the concepts of patterns and includes writing patterns algebraically, using integers in patterns, and solving equations that represent patterns. The 8th grade class extends the regular algebra text with more challenging problems, as well as with extensions on sets of numbers, challenging rate problems, and much more.

MathCounts

The JGMS math competition program, MathCounts, meets after school on Mondays from 2:30 to 3:30 in room B218. Students participating in MathCounts will compete in many competitions, including the American Mathemat-

ics Competition for grade 8 and below (AMC 8), the Collaborative Problem Solving Contest, Math Olympiad, and MathCounts. Each of these competitions will engage students' mathematical talents in different ways, including individual speed competitions, extended problem solving, team competitions, and head-to-head problem solving. All students are invited to train and compete. Any student who cannot attend some meetings due to conflicts with sports or other activities should contact Lisa Fontaine-Rainen to be put on the e-mail list and to get information on how to stay competitive and join when they are able.

WordSmiths

School Scrabble expanded last year! With the goal of providing a place for students to stretch their verbal talents, WordSmiths came into being. So far, it has been a haven for unusual thinkers who like to play with words. Students who wish to continue with School Scrabble, including competition training, are welcome to make every WordSmiths session into Scrabble. Other students may come wanting to workshop writing, do word puzzles, play with poetry, play other word games, discuss books, or anything else with our language that appeals. Students can come with something in mind they'd like to do, or can come see what others are doing and join. WordSmiths meets after school on Thursdays in A117. The program is run under the umbrella of Youth and Family Services After School Program, with additional meetings before and between sessions, and field trips for competitions. Students need to sign up by October 19th through Youth and Family Services.
